3.0 Labour Market Intelligence (LMI)

PB presented to the meeting highlighting key economic facts about the Swindon and Wiltshire area, including average wages, job prospects and strengths and weaknesses of particular sectors. For this meeting, he had also added Gloucestershire to the data as it was a neighbouring area with worthwhile comparative data.

The question was raised as to why there were differences between Swindon and Wiltshire. In response, the two areas had differing economies:

- Swindon's was based in finance and legal services, which was the largest single sector in the combined economy of Swindon and Wiltshire;
- finance and legal had also been a significant sector in Salisbury until Aviva had relocated;
- there were also a large number of small manufacturing companies and pharma around Swindon;
- for Wiltshire, its significant sectors were Professional, Scientific and Technical businesses. Land-based industries occupied a large amount of land and maintained an attractive environment, but their contribution to economy was relatively small;
- however, it did not have the same blend and mix of concentrations of manufacturing like Swindon, nor larger company Headquarters like Nationwide and Zurich; and
- Approximately 98% of businesses in Swindon and Wiltshire were micro and SMEs.

There were changes in working patterns which in turn would affect employment land space and office blocks not being used for offices as more people were working from home. Good quality housing needed to draw in services and the hospitality sector. In order to survive, every town centre needed a mix of sectors, such as housing and leisure, not just retail.



Technical jobs could now be anywhere in the world which was the biggest potential change and small completely digitally based companies which did not have many employees, no offices, and ran their business from phones etc.

There had also been a decline in public provided transport such as buses and train which were not at the level of service provision as pre-pandemic. This was having an impact on learning and work journeys, and not reducing carbon levels as more people took to their cars.

4.0 Partnerships Advisory Board updates

There were no representatives from either Local Authority at the meeting.

Trowbridge

In RB's absence, KG updated the meeting regarding the situation in Trowbridge:

- seven businesses had opened since the beginning of the year in the town centre using vacant unit funding;
- a further two had set up with that support;
- nine were planning to open during the year with grants;
- flats were being made above the shops;
- a block of art studios was planned and a gin bar, deli, and restaurants were due;
- the Town Hall was closing in July and tenants needed to be relocated;
- Wiltshire Council had announced a new leisure centre next to County Hall which it was felt could lead to more traffic issues;
- Castle Place was now mostly empty and had just been sold to a developer;
- the remaining tenants were asking to move within the Town Centre, but some would unfortunately close;
- reaching end of funding allocations. Some funds agreed would not be claimed by landlords because plans were not going ahead;
- the Tech Trowbridge event scheduled for 30 June had been postponed; and
- CS had provided a list of potential attendees to Dr Murrison's office.

Salisbury

PB updated the meeting on the situation in Salisbury:

- projects were mainly around the station into the town and the River Park development;
- the main emphasis was around the culture provision and a strategy for making use of Salisbury's assets.
- developing some grass roots approaches;
- Wiltshire Council was looking at the financial options to develop City Hall, relocating the library and the art gallery into the revamped building;
- the Culture Strategy was being revised and would be published soon; and
- SWLEP would provide information on the financial health of companies in Salisbury for the dashboard.

	 £19m had been allocated from the Future High Streets Fund and Towns Fund and the selected projects were underway; the location of the site for the development of a market in the Town Centre had now been changed after a study had been carried out on footfall for the original proposed site; the new Zurich building on Kimmerfields had recently been officially opened, but a large part of the site was still to be developed; developers were showing an interest in these remaining areas; the Mechanics' Institute was now a significant priority; and with the change of political administration from Conservative to Labour, there were three main areas of focus: to reduce inequality in the town; to look at facilities Swindon needed for the next 30-40 years; and the NetZero and carbon reduction agenda.

EM added that this was an interesting prospect and that she would be happy to link relevant colleagues into the discussion at the appropriate time.

 the South West NetZero Hub had received funding from the Department of Energy Security & NetZero. The Group was applying to carry out a feasibility study to develop heat to power and carbon capture.

The question was raised as to what any new road plans in and out of the site were. There are conditions attached to the planning permission, so Hills was being careful at the moment locally etc.

Economic impact of road improvements

lpsos had a Department of Transport contract to ascertain whether road improvements had any economic impact, but also the environmental impact, and it was hoped that findings would contribute to some policy development.

Mark Matthews from Ipsos, and also a SWLEP Board Director, had approached SWLEP's CEO to see whether we could reach a wider audience. Contact had been established with interested LEPs and questionnaires had been drafted for businesses working in manufacturing or logistics based to gauge transport movements.

The group would be updated on any progress.

The A303 improvements, in particular around Stonehenge, was in the news again. SWLEP was in favour of a solution. The project lead was interested in running hydrogen vehicles throughout the construction.

The size and nature of the Rural Economy across England

SWLEP was conducting a proper analysis of rural areas together with other rural LEPs in order to make informed recommendations to defra. The perception was that the rural economy meant just agriculture. There were indeed large areas of agricultural land, but it held diverse businesses and occupations within it.

Action: KD to contact PB direct for offline discussion on how to become involved.

July 2023

Workplace key points:

- the higher quality commercial space and offices were charging premium prices and were being let;
- however, substandard accommodation, that is, tired and basic, were not being taken up at all;
